i. Ministry of Education Student Learning Survey

ii. Parent Teacher Conferences

Parent Teacher Conferences will take place on MS Teams on Thursday, May 2 from 3:00 – 6:30 PM. The online booking system will close at noon on May 2. There will be an early dismissal at 2:00 PM to allow teachers to prepare for conferences.

iii. Flexible Plastics Collection Program Pilot

Kitsilano will be one of several schools in the district who will be piloting a flexible plastics collection program for the month of May. Students and families will be able to bring their flexible plastics from home to be included in the school's collection by Recycle BC.

- Items accepted: Residential flexible plastics like zipper-lock pouches and stand-up pouches, plastic bags, flexible packaging with a plastic seal, outer bags and overwrap, woven plastic bags, crinkly wrappers and bags (like chip bags and granola bar wrappers).
- Items NOT accepted: Commercial flexible plastics like pallet wrap, plastic tubes, plastic-lined paper or paper-lined plastic, plastic strapping, flexible/soft 6-pack rings, plastics labelled biodegradable, compostable, or oxo-degradable, and polyurethane foam.

Our school will receive \$2 for every kilogram collected.

vii. District Cellphone Restriction Policy

The District is developing a district cellphone restriction policy that will be implemented in Schools starting September 2024. Policy will be included in schools' code of conducts.

There will be restrictions but not a ban. Blocking social media sites will be under discussion. Each school and each teacher has had their own rules. This will bring consistency across the city. There may be some growing pains.

- Q What is meant by "our school is Full"?
- A Our school currently has 1620 students. We expect 1659 in September.
- Q How many International Students are in the school?
- A This number is capped at 120.
- O Is there an optimal time to request classes?
- A Grade 11 or 12 students need to reach out right now if they want to request a change for courses needed for post secondary. Grades 8-10 can ask, too, but the timetables are very tight.

The fee schedule and calendar for next year will be available by the end of May.

- Q Why aren't there more AP [Advanced Placement] classes?
- A Different schools offer different AP classes. Kits offers Psychology and History, but we have a lot of other electives like creative writing. While AP classes can give credit for post-secondary if the student does well they do not give a higher priority for applications.

5.3 <u>Teacher Update</u> - Benita Kwon for Carol-Anne MacMillan

Biography

David J. Robinson is an Algonquin sculptor and educator from Quebec's Timiskaming First Nation, now based in Vancouver, BC. He is also known as Nimki, his Algonquin name, meaning 'Thunder'.

Robinson is a UBC Native Indian Teacher Education Program (NITEP) graduate, certified teacher, UBC Experimental Medicine PhD candidate and former Indigenous Enhancement teacher for the Vancouver School Board. Robinson currently works for the Assembly of First Nations as a Senior Policy Analyst.

Robinsons' public art installations in Vancouver include sculptures at UBC, Robert Lee Alumni Building, Vancouver School Board Office, John Oliver Secondary Learning Commons, Lord Byng Secondary, and the Lelum Health Centre.

v. From Mr. Christopher Matisz

Grade 10 student, **Leo Teixeira**, is the **winner** of this year's province-wide WorkSafeBC Student Safety Video Contest!
